Shorock is responsible for finding quality musical acts from all over the world, but these days, the musicians often come to him. While it doesn't pay much, the Back Room is perfect for musicians with a one-day layover between shows in, for example, Kansas City and Denver. They like the setting and the hospitality they receive. Many enjoy spending a night at Heartland Farm in rural Pawnee Rock, he said.

For Fraud, signing a contract with the Back Room was their proof to Irish authorities that they had a real job waiting overseas. They were then booked at festivals and coffee houses across the country.

The brothers played guitars and Andrew sang for about 45 minutes before the first break.

Buehler and his friends, all in their earlier 20s, listened to the band on the Internet (www.fraudtheband.com) before Friday's concert, and could probably have sung along when Andrew and Freddy launched into their

song "Lemonade." The new fans invited them to a bonfire after the show, but Andrew said they had to get up early Saturday and head to the Tumbleweed Festival in Garden City.

During the break, audience members stretched their legs in the art gallery, where Ellinwood High School art instructor Greg Maxwell is the featured artist of the month. In September, the gallery will feature paintings and prints by another Ellinwood area native, Lawrence Robl. People snacked on coffee cake and tea or chatted with the band members, who were selling copies of their first CD for \$5 each.

McKown asked how they chose the name "Fraud." It may have been a misunderstanding, Andrew said. When their manager asked about a name, he suggested they use Freddy's nickname, "Frod," but the manager thought they were saying "Fraud."

By the beginning of the second set, audience members were speaking to the Irish singers as if they were old

friends. One woman advised them to raise the price of their discs. "Americans like to spend money," she said.

The number of people who have discovered the "secret" of the Back Room continues to grow. Zach Smith, one of the people who came with Buehler, said the venue is "something I'd definitely go back to."

Jason Whisnant, one of the regulars, said he wishes there were concerts every week. "It's a worthwhile thing to have in Great Bend," he said. "It's great having live music."

Although reservations are always recommended because of the limited seating, Arts Council members aren't always sure how many people will show up. CPI Qualified Plan Consultants Inc., one of Great Bend's largest private employers, underwrites the Back Room and many of the tickets are often picked up by CPI employees. The Barton County Arts Council also receives funding from Barton County, the City of Great Bend, the Kansas Arts Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts.
